Municipal Budget

Council is getting ready to review the proposed 2024 - 2028 Financial and Business Plan and budget for the year. They will consider several factors in their decisions and would like to hear the views of the community This handout includes the key information from the budget to assist you with sharing your feedback. In This Proposed Budget

This Financial and Corporate Business Plan shows that Creston continues to be an adaptable and resilient community as the economy, climate, and community changes. In addition to maintaining a **high level of service** in our parks, trails, roads, water, sewer, storm water, fire, bylaw, RCMP and more, here are some of the things this budget aims to deliver:

- Improved community safety with the addition of an emergency management program coordinator and a fire services coordinator using offsetting revenue from RDCK contracts and new contractual revenue from College of the Rockies.
- The development of a municipal housing corporation for the direct delivery of attainable and affordable housing, which capitalizes on federal and provincial grant funding.
- Building reliable utilities with continued investment in capital reserves for future repair or replacement of water, and sewer infrastructure.
- Governance improvements to achieve savings, increase transparency and gain organizational efficiency by implementing a centralized pocurement program, including the addition of a procurement officer.



*The above charts provide a summary of the key parts of this year's budget, showing all of the different sources of revenue that fund our services and where the bulk of the funds are spent. The difference between the two is transferred into our reserves to fund asset improvement and replacement.

Proposed Municipal Tax Rate Increase

In order to maintain service levels, further investments in safety, and to advance priorities like planning for attainable and affordable housing, the Town has identified a tax increase range for Council to consider. This range includes:

- 0.57% increase to fund investment into infrastructure reserves to continue building future savings for repair and replacement of roads, water, storm water, and sewer infrastructure.
- 2.77% increase to address operational increases associated with inflationary costs, and external pressures on Town services.
- 1.99% increase to address operational increases associated with inflationary costs on the RCMP municipal policing contract.
- 2.04% increase to fund Council's priorities including an emergency management program coordinator, fire services coordinator, workflow automation, implementing a procurement program, and tree planting.



The Path to 2024

A main factor driving this year's proposed increase is sustained high inflation and public expectation for maintaining service levels. The total inflation between 2020 and 2023 was 16.63%. In efforts to keep taxation low, total taxation increases stayed below inflation with only 10.6% taxation increases over the same period.

Faced with the challenge of budgeting to maintain levels of service based on resident expectations while attempting to balance actual inflationary increases with taxation increases has created lean operational budgets. The operational budgets cannot absorb additional cost fluctuations throughout the year without ensuring some parity with inflation.

2024 Proposed Municipal Budget and You

The proposed 2024 - 2028 Financial and Corporate Business Plan includes a starting point tax rate of 7.3%. The following chart shows the estimated monthly increase for property taxes based on the average residential or commercial property. While the tax rate increase is 7.3%, the result is approximately 6.69% for residential and 8.43% for commercial.

ESTIMATED TOTAL MONTHLY INCREASES

Residents

6.69% = \$8.98

Businesses 8.43% = \$22

Residents average annual increase of 6.69% per year is based on average annual property assessment of \$426,339. Businesses average annual increase of 8.43% per year is based on annual average property assessment of \$390,692.

The tax rate increase is in addition to the increases approved for utility rates in December 2023. The 2024 Utility Rate Review is currently in progress and will inform rate for 2025.

Average Residential Property will pay an estimated additional \$21 annually, approximately \$1.75 more per month.

Business Tax Multiplier 2023

The business taxpayer pays more than the residential taxpayer recognizing their greater use of Town assets and infrastructure.



Can't we use our reserves?

It is not sustainable to borrow from reserves to lower a taxation increase. Just like if your monthly household expenses go up but your total income doesn't, you can dip into your savings for a while, but at some point you have to readjust. This budget maintains the level of service the public expects and ensures they remain affordable in the future.

What's next?

The Town follows a multi-step process to develop the Business and Financial Plans. It combines community feedback with Council priorities and department needs to prepare the next 5-year Business and Financial Plan. Below are some of the key steps and dates in this year's budget cycle.

April 2023 - October 2023

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Budget survey conducted on Let's Talk Creston and mailed to all residents in Creston.

November 2023

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

The Draft 2024–2028 Financial and Corporate Business Plan is released for public review and engagement ahed of budget delibertions, including a mail-out to all residents.

March 12, 2024

NOTICES

Residents receive notice of the adopted 2023 tax rate as approved by Council.

COUNCIL STRATEGIC PLANNING

Council's Strategic Plan sets out Council's ambition to make our shared vision of a vibrant and connected community a reality.

November 2023

DELIBERATE

Council received presentations over a two-day period from all municipal departments for the proposed 2024 budgets, as well as review of public engagement results from Let's Talk Creston and mail-out.

February 2024

ADOPTION

Council votes to adopt the 2024-2028 Five Year Financial Plan.

May – June 2024
