There was also an abundance of fresh produce in the summer, which we celebrated at the vibrant farmers' markets throughout town. However, what I loved most about Creston was the strong sense of community and genuine warmth of its people. I was lucky to have been connected with the local pickleball league, whose members were exceptionally kind to me and patient with my novice skills. There were also multiple patients of the clinic who were eager to invite me to their orchards and farms.

I had the incredible opportunity to work with and learn from Dr. Johnny Chang, to whom I cannot say thank you enough. He embraces a fullscope rural family practice, delivering care at his clinic, in the inpatient setting, in the emergency department, as well as in longterm care.
